

Atlanta Technical College COVID-19 FAQs

- How can I protect myself?
 - By wearing your PPE, maintaining proper distance from others and washing your hands.
- What should I do or who should I notify on campus if I have been exposed or test positive?
 - Students should contact their instructors
 - Employees should contact their immediate supervisor
- Who do I contact for resources if I need assistance (mental/social services/financial) during the pandemic?

- Where can I get tested?

- Should I get a COVID-19 test if someone on campus tested positive?
 - No. You do not need to be tested just because you know someone that has COVID-19. Even if you are identified as a Close Contact by Public Health you do not need to be tested right away. A test is a snapshot in time of your infection status. COVID-19 has an incubation period of 2 to 14 days. Symptoms generally appear in 5 to 6 days. For this reason, a person can test negative on one day but then test positive on the next day. However, you should get tested for COVID-19 if you yourself are experiencing symptoms of the illness.
- I have a family member in my home that was tested for COVID-19, should I come to campus?
 - No. Under the current guidelines if you have a family member in your home that
 has been tested for COVID-19 because they have symptoms or are suspected to
 have COVID-19 then you and your family members in your house should be in
 quarantine for 14 days.
- Is it safe for me to come to campus if required for classes?
 - Yes, as long as you are following social distancing guidelines. Your risk of infection is reduced as long as you stay at least 6 feet apart. now under quarantine as they are a Close Contact of a positive case. You have not had close contact (within 6 feet for 15 minutes or more) with the coworker's spouse so you are not a Close Contact. You are a contact of a contact and at no greater risk than normal for infection.
- Do I have to wear a face covering while on campus?
 - Yes, while a face covering does not reduce your risk of infection, it does reduce the risk to others. It is also the College's policy to wear face coverings.
- After being in close contact with someone with COVID-19, can I return to campus if I test negative for COVID-19?



- No. A test is a snapshot in time of your infection status on the day the test was taken. COVID-19 has an incubation period of 2 to 14 days and symptoms generally appear in 5 to 6 days. For this reason a person can test negative on one day but then test positive the next day.
- I only have one symptom of COVID-19, should I come to campus?
 - No. If you have a symptom of any infection you are sick and should stay home. If the symptom is respiratory related contact your doctor or an Urgent Care Center
- I spent a lot of time in the same space with someone that tested positive, should I be quarantined or tested?
 - No. Unless you have had close contact (within 6 feet for 15 minutes or more) with an individual that has tested positive, you are at no greater risk than you normally are for becoming infected with COVID-19. If you are socially distanced in a space occupied by a person that is positive, Public Health does not consider you to be a Close Contact and you will not be quarantined.
